Host 1: And Headphones. Please, people. Headphones.

Host 2: Yes, a thousand times.

Host 1: Don't forget to signal for your stop, either.

Host 2: That's a big one that people miss.

Host 1: Helps the driver out, makes it smoother for everyone.

Host 2: Exactly.

Host 1: Okay, now the fun part. What not to do on the bus.

Host 2: Oh, I'm sure we've all seen some things.

Host 1: Let's be real, we've all probably broken a rule or two.

Host 2: Maybe. But seriously, Space Coast Area Transit is clear.

Host 1: So we've covered the basics of riding.

Host 2: What's next?

Host 1: Now let's get into the tech side of things.

Host 2: Okay, this is where Space Coast Area Transit really shines.

Host 1: I agree. They've really embraced technology to make riding smoother and keep you informed.

Host 2: And it maps out the best routes, tells you transfer points, even how long you'll be walking.

Host 1: That's so convenient.

Host 2: And you can plan for future trips, pick a specific date and time.

Host 1: Perfect for getting organized for the week ahead.

Host 2: Exactly, no more Monday morning scramble.

Host 1: Okay, let's talk about paying for the ride. What are the options? Exact change. Bus passes.

Host 2: Space Coast Area Transit offers a few convenient options. You can buy passes online, either

through their website or the Token Transit app. By mail or over the phone. They've got 10 ride passes, 30 day passes, and even reduced fares if you qualify.

Host 1: Ooh, discounts. I like the sound of that.

Host 2: They offer reduced fares for military personnel, seniors, students, and individuals who use mobility devices.

Host 1: That's fantastic. It makes public transportation accessible to so many more people. How do you apply for a reduced fare ID card?

Host 2: It's all done online. Super easy.

You just go to the reduced fare ID section on the website, upload the required documents, and you'll get an email when your eligibility is confirmed. Then you can start buying those discounted passes.

Host 1: No more waiting in line or filling out endless paperwork.

Host 2: Nope. Technology makes it so much easier.

Host 1: You mentioned this Token Transit app earlier.

Tell me more about that. What is it exactly?

- **Host 2:** So, Token Transit is a mobile ticketing app. You buy and store your bus passes right on your phone. No more paper passes. No more scrambling for cash.

Host 1: Even how to apply for reduced fare passes.
